Lesson 58 - The Passing Of The Mantle

Some years ago, while I was studying the Book of Acts, the commentator made the following observation which I have shared on many occasions. He said, "We all inherit work from our predecessor, and leave work to our successor". That's exactly what's happening here in 1 Kings 19:19.

1st Point A Principle On How God Chooses A Servant (1 Kings 19:19)

- In this verse we read ...who was plowing with twelve yoke of oxen...
- Elisha, who will succeed Elijah, is busy working.
- When Elijah found Elisha, he was busy plowing in the field.
- One of my instructors shared this interesting and consistent principle that is seen throughout Scripture.
- "God consistently called people who are busy doing something."
- They may not be doing that which is right, like the Apostle Paul, but they are busy. They weren't lazy
- My grandfather told me; "find a man who will not work and he will not amount to anything in life."
- 2nd principle / God's call is from something to something else.
- We see this principle right here with Elisha.

2nd Point The Symbolic Act Of Leadership Change (1 Kings 19:19...cast his mantle upon him.)

- You see, throwing a prophet's cloak on a person symbolized the passing of power and authority of the office to that individual.
- Notice that Elisha realized the meaning of this act by his reaction
- Immediately Elisha started to abandon his former occupation and followed Elijah
- Note in **verse 20** that Elijah gave him permission to say farewell to his family.
- Note also in **verse 21** that Elisha sealed his decision by:
 - slaughtering his oxen,
 - o burning his plowing tools,
 - o and then hosted a farewell banquet
 - o then he would serve his sacrificed animals to his guest for supper After doing all this, Elisha would leave and accompany Elijah as his servant.

When our Lord called HIS disciples, He commanded them to drop their nets and follow HIM.

- The Apostle Paul stopped <u>persecuting the Church</u> and started <u>preaching to the Church</u>.
- The Apostle Peter stopped <u>denying the Lord</u> and started <u>defending the Lord</u>.

3rd Point Three Victorious Battles (1 Kings 20:1-12)

- When come to chapter 20, the scene now shifts from Elijah to King Ahab.
- We have three battles that King Ahab fought and all three resulted in victories.
- There's are many lessons here for us saints to learn.
- Remember, we've already studied about the removal of Baal worship throughout the land.
- Victory comes after sin is removed.
- Saints, that is still true today!

4th Point The First Victory (1 Kings 20:1-12)

- There was this King Ben-Hadad II the King of Aram, Israel's northern neighbor.
- He, along with 32 other rulers, would go up to the hill of Samaria and attack King Ahab.
- What happens next is truly fascinating.
- Let's read the account:
 - This King Ben-Hadad would send messengers to King Ahab with his demand to withdraw (vs. 2-3)
 - He demanded silver, and gold, and wives, and children. (v. 3)
 - King Ahab realizes that he is outnumbered so he submitted to these terms
 (v. 4)
 - Here's where things get really interesting.
 - Undoubtably, King Ben-Hadad regretted what he asked for thinking that his demands were too easy based on the fact that King Ahab agreed to them so quickly without any resistance.
 - So, King Ben-Hadad would send his messengers back with a new demand (vs. 5-6)
- Now let's consider what this demand says:
 - King Ben-Hadad now wanted everything of value he could lay his hand on.
 - THE SINFUL HEART CAN NEVER BE SATISFIED!

5th Point The Importance Of Wise Counsel (1 Kings 20:7-8)

- What King Ahab does next is one of the wisest decisions he made as a King.
- He consulted with the elders. If only he had consulted them about changing the worship of the LORD God.
- What does the Bible say about wise counsel?

- Let's consider the words of Solomon in **Proverbs 11:14**
- Here Solomon is saying that a multitude of counselors provides security and that those who refuse wise advice are foolish
- The benefits of wise counsel:
- **A)** Wisdom and Growth you see a wise person listens to advice and becomes even wiser (**Proverbs 1:5**)
- **B)** Avoid foolishness (**Proverbs 12:15**)

6th Point Pride Goeth Before A Fall (1 Kings 20:9-12)

- What happens in these verses shows us the dangers of pride.
- King Ahab tells the messengers of King Ben-Hadad that he would honor the first demand, but not the second (v. 9).
- This didn't sit well with King Ben-Hadad; he was enraged and boasted that he was gonna destroy Samaria (v. 10)
- King Ahab responded by telling King Ben-Hadad that he shouldn't boast of victory before he has actually achieved victory (v. 11)
- We can't but see the danger of being under the influence of strong drink (v. 12)

7th Point The Grace Of God (1 Kings 20:12-13)

- What happens next is truly the action of a loving God.
- In **verse 12** King Ben-Hadad is preparing to attack.
- Meanwhile in **verse 13** a prophet, whose name is not given, went to Ahab with a message from the LORD.
- The message says; God's gonna deliver the huge Aramean army into King Ahab hand.
- WHY? So that Ahab would know that HE IS THE LORD!
- Saints, God's goodness here isn't prompted by Ahab's godliness but by God's own grace.
